STUDENT NOTES (TWO SESSIONS ONLY)

Throughout our time together, Revelation 2:1-7 will be our primary focus.

Write to the angel of the church in Ephesus:

Thus says the one who holds the seven stars in his right hand and who walks among the seven golden lampstands:

I know your works, your labor, and your endurance, and that you cannot tolerate evil people. You have tested those who call themselves apostles and are not, and you have found them to be liars. I know that you have persevered and endured hardships for the sake of my name, and you have not grown wearry. But I have this against you: You have abandoned the love you had at first. **Remember** then how far you have fallen; **repent**, and **do the works you did at first**. Otherwise, I will come to you and remove your lampstand from its place, unless you repent. Yet you do have this: You hate the practices of the Nicolaitans, which I also hate.

Let anyone who has ears to hear listen to what the Spirit says to the churches. To the one who conquers, I will give the right to eat from the tree of life, which is in the paradise of God.

Jesus shares these words with John the apostle for the church at Ephesus. The "angel" He references is likely the pastor of the church. In this letter for the church, and in all subsequent letters in chapters 2 and 3 of Revelation, Christ follows a similar format. He introduces Himself; commends the church on some things, critiques them on others, and then offers a solution for their situation. He closes by challenging them to truly hear what the Spirit is saying to them and offers them a promise, if they follow through in obedience.

The critical part of this letter is the reality they "abandoned the love you had at first."

It is here that we start our workshop today.

SESSION 1: REMEMBER and REPENT

- Lack of obedience to Christ's commands, sinful disobedience
- Lack of love for one another, bitterness, unforgiveness, disunity
- Pride, arrogance, selfishness, or other un-Christlike behaviors
- Lack of concern for the things God cares about like the poor or the lost
- Declining regularity of fellowship (and attendance) with the rest of the body of Christ
- Struggle to get volunteers willing to serve in the Lord's work
- The absence of joy in public worship
- Little desire for corporate communication with God through prayer
- Holding on to preferences and personal opinions rather than the priority of God and His purposes for us

SESSION 2: RENEW

When they had eaten breakfast, Jesus asked Simon Peter, "Simon, son of John, do you love me more than these?" "Yes, Lord," he said to him, "you know that I love you." "Feed my lambs," he told him. A second time he asked him, "Simon, son of John, do you love me?" "Yes, Lord," he said to him, "you know that I love you." "Shepherd my sheep," he told him. He asked him the third time, "Simon, son of John, do you love me?" Peter was grieved that he asked him the third time, "Do you love me?" He said, "Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you." "Feed my sheep," Jesus said. "Truly I tell you, when you were younger, you would tie your belt and walk wherever you wanted. But when you grow old, you will stretch out your hands and someone else will tie you and carry you where you don't want to go." He said this to indicate by what kind of death Peter would glorify God. After saying this, he told him, "Follow me." After his denial of Jesus preceding the Savior's crucifixion, Jesus confronts Peter by the shores of the Sea of Galilee. In an attempt to facilitate restoration and a new chapter in Peter's relationship with Jesus, our Lord speaks to the disciple's continued love for Him. Not satisfied with where their relationship is already, Jesus challenges him to a new depth in their relationship. He does this with us, too. What expectations do we often make that affect the way we relate to Jesus? What assumptions do we often make that affect the way we relate to Jesus? What do we need to unlearn or relearn? How do we respond? What will we do?

Now, the scene moves to one of Peter's final encounters with Jesus in John 21:15-19.
